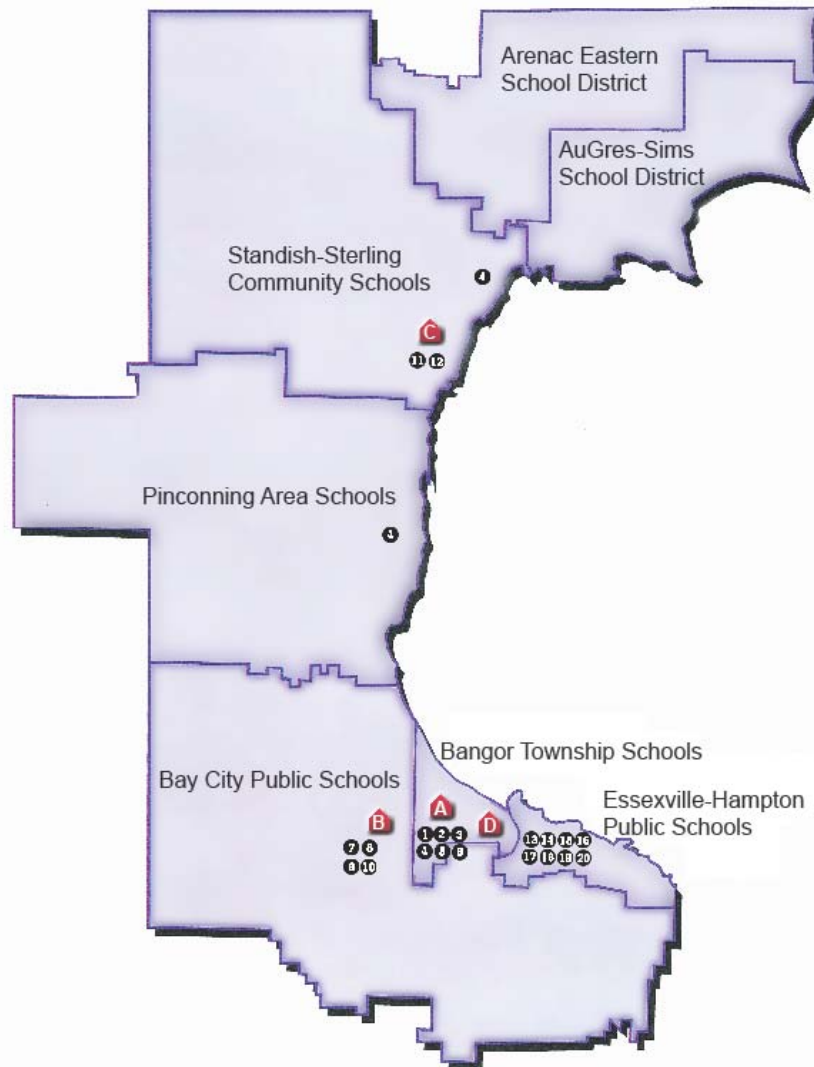

Guide to Special Education Services

Although state law mandates many Special Education services provided by Bay-Arenac ISD, we embrace our responsibility to ensure meaningful learning opportunities for students with special needs. Our staff is committed to innovative and compassionate instruction for students within **Bay City Public Schools**.

The following Special Education *programs* are provided by Bay-Arenac ISD:

Career and Technical Education Services

Programs at the Bay-Arenac ISD Career Center offer a wide variety of experiences and specific technical training that gives students from the **Bay City Public School District** an advantage when entering the work force or college. Students enrolled in programs at the Career Center or in any of at the two off-site classroom locations may earn industry-standard certifications and college credit.

The following Career and Technical Education *services* were offered to the **Bay City Public School District**:

- *Career & Technical Education for 11th & 12th graders*
- *A summer Academy that offers both Academic and Career and Technical Education classes during Summer School*
- *Administration of the Region 8 (Bay, Arenac, Midland and Saginaw Counties) Carl Perkins Grant*
- *Advisory Committees (business and industry professionals assist with curriculum, student clubs, equipment, job placement and community service projects)*
- *Articulation agreements (college credit can be earned in all the Career Center programs)*
- *Business partnerships (related work experience leading to employment or additional training)*
- *Career pathway exploration for LEA 4th, 8th, and 10th grade students*
- *Certifications/program credentialing (state and national industry-standard certifications)*
- *Construction of a new wireless 36,000 square foot Health and Science wing that opened for in the fall of 2008*



Other Career and Technical Education *services* provided

- *Community participation (students demonstrate learned skills and take an active roll in the community throughout the school year)*
- *Three new Career and Technical Education programs for students including Veterinary Science, Forensic Science and Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Sports Medicine*
- *Assists with meeting the requirements of the Michigan Merit Curriculum. Students have the opportunity to earn academic credit while attending the Career Center*
- *Counseling services (licensed, professional counselors assist students with career development, responsible services, self-awareness and personal skill development, academic support, and True Colors workshops)*
- *Counselors partner students with community college and university representatives to provide information about financial aid, scholarships degree offerings and more*
- *Guidance services (licensed, professional counselors provide student assistance)*
- *CTE technical support and planning*
- *Technology integration (providing students with industry-standard training in all program areas)*
- *Less-than-class-size training (opportunities for students exploring programs of study or careers that are unique or are special in nature)*
- *Placement services (specialists work with business and industry to provide student training and employment opportunities)*
- *Programs of study (address communications, business, health, human services, manufacturing and natural resources)*



Other Career and Technical Education *services* provided

- *Student organizations (students develop technical and leadership qualities through activities and competitions in one of five national career and technical organizations)*

Guide to Instructional Services

Staff efforts within Bay-Arenac ISD's Instructional Services focus, first and foremost, on student achievement.

Curriculum Content Teams, representing each local school district within BAISD boundaries, review and design curriculum which is aligned to the Michigan Curriculum Framework, Standards and Benchmarks, and Grade and Course Level Content Expectations, according to a plan developed by the BAISD Curriculum Council. Support services are available to districts and buildings to assist with implementation of curriculum at individual sites.



Bay-Arenac ISD designs relevant, comprehensive and timely professional development to benefit all area administrators and teachers. Presenters include respected experts who address a variety of learning styles and share best practice. Classes and workshops are offered at locations and times most convenient for those we serve. Many sessions are held in the buildings of local school districts.

The Imagination Library

The Imagination Library provides all children in Bay and Arenac counties—age birth to five-years-old—an age appropriate, hard cover book each month until they turn five. Bay-Arenac ISD and educators throughout local school districts in our communities embrace the concept of preschool reading as integral to student success. Reading aloud is one of the most important things parents and care-givers can do for their children.

Facts about Reading to Young People:

- *The key to proficiency in reading is to start early. Begin reading to a child the day he/she is born.*
- *35% of children arrive at kindergarten unprepared to learn. (National data)*
- *Interaction with his/her environment is a key factor in determining the ease with which a child will learn to read.*
- *The more words a child hears, the larger the child's vocabulary. The larger the child's vocabulary, the more likely he/she will be a proficient reader.*



- *A 1991 study showed that parents who were given books...were four times more likely to read and share them with their children*
- *Reading to a baby encourages the child to associate reading with love and comfort.*
- *The more a parent or guardian talks and reads to their baby, the quicker the child will learn.*
- *The report of the Commission on Reading states that “the single most important activity for building the knowledge required for eventual success in reading is reading aloud to children.”*

Administrative and Support Services

Bay-Arenac ISD provides a range of administrative and support services to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of local school district operations.
